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EQUINE HEALTHSENSE

March, the busy month for reproduction problems. New foals are arriving and plans for next year's crop are being made.

Cleanliness is the mother to infection-free reproduction. Barn-lots and dirty stalls are loaded with bacteria that will or can quickly cripple or destroy a newborn foal. Tetanus which is known as lock-jaw in lay language, lurks almost wherever a horse exists. Numerous bacteria cause diarrhea and joint infections. These microscopic organisms can enter the bloodstream of a colt through the broken umbilical cord or through the mouth of a normal foal.

Prevention is much more economical and practical than death or medication. Pour iodine on or better yet, soak the umbilical stump of the new foal in iodine. Also the long lasting antibiotics given to a new born will destroy many bad bacteria before they can invade the vital areas. Tetanus antitoxin can prevent lockjaw if given to the baby equine.

The mare should also be protected at the time of birth. Tetanus toxoid booster and a long acting antibiotic will be protection well received by the new mother.

Tragedy may leave an orphan to care for. Many have raised these colts with the purchase of a nanny goat that is giving milk. Hourly feeding for the first few days is important. If the mother died before the foal consumed any of her first milk, antibiotics are very important to protect the baby. Colostrum or first milk contains extremely important ingredients that give protection to any new baby.

Mares that did not settle last year should be prepared for breeding this year. Start with a very accurate history of the last several years and especially every cover date from last season. With this information and a thorough examination by your veterinarian, chances of conception are much better.

Proper nutrition, routine worming, checking teeth, and consideration of

general health are included in fertility programs. High levels of vitamins A & E aid in reproduction of the equine.

After attending several veterinary medical meetings and hearing case reports involving some of the new wormers on the open market, you should consult your veterinarian! Dcaths have occurred in cases where tranquillizers or anesthetics were used following the use of some of the chemical wormers. Had the veterinarian known about the worming, alternate methods of treatment could have been attempted. Too often the easiest and cheapest is the most difficult and most expensive.

Show dates were reserved for 1968 indicating an even more active show season. Clubs having already made show plans gave reports on events, premiums and facilities offered.

The K.S.H.A. is a well organized association. Its members specialize in the finer arts of horsemanship including jumping, English, western, pony and cart, five gaited and many other events. It follows the standard set by the American Horse Shows Association and is truly an all-breed organization. It is unique in its show classification and point system and recognition of championship titles. Anyone may show K.S.H.A. without belonging to the association or an affiliated club and is entitled to any premiums awarded. However, for recognition of points a contestant must belong to the association.

The Horseman's Harold magazine was also present at the convention represented by its editor. The editor out-lined the magazine and the advantages it offered the association.

SS Training Stables

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As I See It

While reading this column, keep in mind its title. It means exactly "As I See It by Bill Evans". In no way will the views expressed begin intend to be the official word nor does the author set himself up as a professional analist. This will become a monthly column discussing topics of controversy with an attempt to shed some light over these subjects.

The "Romper", the preceder of the Horseman's Herald, became popular with this text. Demand grew and the Horseman's Herald was necessary. Since then this type of article was given up for fear association leaders wouldn't approve, whose support this young publication needed desperately. Now some complain

they miss the old "Romper".

On occasion an article of controversy was inserted in the Horseman's Herald. Some would get their dander up (including our leaders) and others would comment more should be said. Regardless of pro or con it served the purpose of communication, open conversation and straight forwardness needed for a

clearer understanding and activating interest.

For instance - last fall this editor wrote an article opposed to a proposed K.W.H.A. rule change. The then state president, Jim Snyder, cornered the author and expressed his opinion that the article was way off base. The K.W.H.A. official newsletter later came out strongly condemning the article and stated that the officers and directors had proposed the rule change for the betterment of the association. The editor also contends the article was written for the betterment of the association. The rule change won out and the officers and editor parted in good faith and continue to support one another.

Still the subject is far from dead. Not just activated by this column but by members over the state. The vote was relatively close so there are less than half the membership dissatisfied. It doesn't take a prophet to predict another

proposal for 1968.

Another issue foaled this winter is the National Saddle Clubs Association championship show to be held in Montana for 1968. Undoubtedly Kansas is up in arms for there's a sense of state rivalry here and in the northern state. In competative sports this is healthy but in its administration it can also be a cause for suspicion.

The 1967 show was held in Littleton, Colorado, where for the most part -Kansas, Montana, and Colorado battled it out. Kansas, as a state, tallied up the greater number of points with Montana and lesser organized Colorado to

follow.

Well, common sense will tell you what would happen if the national show were to be held in Kansas. Look what happened the first year (1966) when it

was held in Montana. Montana must have walked away with it.

Many Kansans have expressed the feeling that the national show should be centrally located each year - like Colorado! I say NO! (Boy - boy, our Kansas members will be down my throat again.) In Colorado, Kansas could send a fair representation as could Montana but how long would it be before Colorado

would completely dominate the show and even the association.

Still there's more to it than that. The N.S.C.A. has a potential of becoming one of the largest horse organizations in the world - providing. Just as few Kansans will pull horses to Montana, let alone over the mountains, few distant states will travel to Montana or Colorado. These distant states have shown a great interest in the N.S.C.A. but it will be lost fast if they aren't given the hope of participation. Among these states you can include Oregon who sent a fine delegation to the 1967 show. What do you suppose it would do for the association to have the championship show there on the west coast? Maybe entry wise it wouldn't be as large a show, just maybe. But how many organizations, clubs and individual members do you suppose it would add to the N.S.C.A.?

Would we lose some here in the Great Plains? Possibly - those who's interest center on themselves or honestly and without doubt believe the show should remain in one location.

Still, the 1968 N.S.C.A. championship show will be held in Montana. Needless to say many are unhappy and there's great feelings of dejection at least in Kansas. Montana must feel a little uneasy, too, at least those with best wishes for the association.

Among those most concerned is past president, Keith Herrin. Keith is the father of the N.S.C.A. and a good one at that. He has a clear picture of the situation and what another national show in Montana means. What makes it even tougher for him is the fact that he's from Montana. He has bent over backwards and shut his eyes for one thing or another for what he felt to be the best for the association even though it could be challenged by association rules. What he can not do is jeopardize the dream of national competition of "games on horseback" by permitting the national show to be held without regard for the association rules or its adminis-

The site for the national show is selected by bid and only two bids were submitted for 1968 - Colorado and Montana. The N.S.C.A. officers ruled the Colorado bid unlawful even to the extent of overtaking the association. President Herrin made attempts to have Colorado make changes in their bid to make it acceptable but Colorado reported no changes could be made. What other alternative was left but to accept the Montana bid?

Why doesn't Kansas and other states make a bid? Kansas has a countless number of saddle club grounds but very few, if any at all, are equipped for a national show. Still facilities, arena size demanded and lack of seating capacity handicap the wheat state.

This editor will go on record advocating the N.S.C.A. championship show should be moved to any or all affiliated states whenever possible. This editor also feels all representatives of the association should first be N.S.C.A. representatives and second representatives for their states. That is, not just working for the advantage of their home state but an honest job for the National Saddle Clubs Association. At Stud

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Chitter - Chatter

This article was in our local paper put out by our Stafford County agent Don Peterson. This is important news and could probably apply to horses as well as cattle. Especially if horses are allowed to run with cattle and eat with them.

GET THE LICE NOT THE CATTLE Systemic insecticides are potent and they can be injurious to cattle when they are used more than one at a time.

Cattlemen may already be using ronnel(RON-el) through a mineral supplement, then spray with another systemic. This double-dosage can be serious.

Or cattlemen may spray on a systemic when the cattle have been given internal medications, such as phenothiazeine. In this case, the internal medication may spark an extreme reaction to the spray - cause it to affect the animal far more than normally.

Do not use systemics on very young, sick, streased or overheated animals. They can be harmed by it. Ronnel, Neguvon, and Coumaphos are among top insecticides on the market for controlling lice, but all three are systemic materials and need special care when they are used to avoid injury to livestock.

Lice also can be controlled with such non-systemic materials as methoxychlor, lindane or toxaphene.
